Recycle Drive 2016

Managing waste is one of HNL's top five priorities under its new Sustainable Management Plan (SMP). By 2020, HNL aims to reduce MSW per passenger by 4% and to increase the Airport's recycling rate by 4%. HNL hosts Recycle Drives to encourage sustainable waste management practices across the Airport community.

The second annual HNL Recycle Drive was able to support 23 Airport tenants in diverting recyclable items from Airport's municipal waste stream (MSW). The highly anticipated event accepted bulky items, scrap metal, and e-waste.

FOD Walk Fall 2016

Effective waste management at any airport must include a robust FOD program. FOD, or Foreign Object Debris/Damage, is any object, particle, debris, or other substance that does not belong on the airside of an airport. FOD threatens the safety of aircraft, airport vehicles, equipment, airport employees, and passengers. Above all else, an airport must be run safely to be truly sustainable.

HNL hosts FOD walks to bring the Airport community together and reinforce FOD awareness. More than 150 volunteers participated in the third airport-wide FOD Walk event. Walking along the perimeter of the airside terminal gate areas, the volunteers picked up everything from nuts and bolts to random plastic pieces and even rocks.
